Garbage Collection

Garbage is collected twice a week on Mondays and Thursdays OR Tuesdays and Fridays, depending on your location, **EXCEPT on holidays**.

Place it in an accessible location the night before or by 5:30 a.m. on your collection day. It must be bagged or placed in metal or plastic barrels. Garbage sheds are permitted. Pathways must be unobstructed and cleared of snow and ice.

Rubbish Collection

Rubbish will be collected twice a week on your garbage collection days, **EXCEPT on holidays**. Place it at the curb the night before or by 5:30 a.m. on the morning of the pickup. Maximum quantity per pickup: five (5) 32-gallon barrels or the equivalent.

Skipped or Missed Pickups

If your garbage, rubbish, or recycling is not picked up, call the DPW at **777-7745**.

HAZARDOUS WASTE

Westchester County's Household Material Recovery Facility (H-MRF) in Valhalla accepts household hazardous waste and other items that require special handling.

These items include chemicals such as pesticides, herbicides, automotive and pool fluids, flammable liquids, as well as expired or unused prescription or over-the-counter medications. Also electronic waste (computers, TVs, laptops, monitors, fax machines, copiers, digital cameras, cell phones, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, propane tanks, batteries, tires, household

ACCEPTABLE RUBBISH

- **Furniture**—not to exceed the five 32-gallon limit.
- **Mattresses**
- **Sofa bed**—metal frames must be removed.
- **Carpeting**—must be rolled and tied; rolls must not exceed 4 feet in length.
- **Latex and oil paint cans**—paint must be hardened before disposal; remove lids from cans.
- **Christmas trees**—**without tinsel, lights or decorations**—will be picked up after the holiday season.

UNACCEPTABLE RUBBISH ITEMS The following items **will not** be collected at the curb or accepted at the Recycling Center on Fayette Avenue:

- **Construction debris**, building materials, rubber tires, tree stumps, dirt, stones, clay flower pots, ceramic sinks, bathtubs, toilets and all other non-burnable materials.
- **Extra-large items** such as pianos, pool tables, whole bathtubs. Call a private carter for collection.
- **Hazardous waste** such as acids, alcohols, garden chemicals, pesticides and solvents. See below for information on Hazardous Waste.
- **Radioactive waste.**
- **CFLs & other fluorescent lights.** Take to Home Depot, Lowe's, or to the County's Household Material Recovery Facility (H-MRF).

appliances, mercury thermometers, fire extinguishers, documents for shredding, and more. No paint is accepted.

The H-MRF is open on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays (except on federal holidays) from 10 a.m. to 2:50 p.m. Residents must make a reservation either online (westchestergov.com/hmrf) or by telephone (914-813-5425), and show a valid driver's license on arrival. Call or go online for directions and additional information.

CELLPHONES, CARTRIDGES, ETC.

Take your old cellphones, inkjet, laser and toner cartridges to Village Hall at the Regatta for recycling. Place them in the designated containers.

MEDICAL NEEDLES, SYRINGES & LANCETS

"Sharps" should be collected in a sturdy container with a screw top, such as a detergent bottle.

Label it "Sharps" with a waterproof marker.

Place each used needle,



syringe or lancet in the container immediately after use, secure the screw top and keep the container safe from children. When full, seal with heavy tape and place in your trash, **never** in a recycling bin.

An alternative is to take the sealed and labeled container to a hospital, nursing home or other health facility that accepts sharps.

BULK METAL & APPLIANCES

Bulk metal waste is picked up at the curb once a month on the Wednesday scheduled for your district (see last page), **except** when that day is a holiday. There is no need to call in advance to schedule a pickup. Do not place at the curb more than 24 hours before collection.

WHAT TO RECYCLE—refrigerators or freezers with doors removed, stoves, air conditioners, lawn mowers, boilers, snow blowers, pipes, and other metal items. **Please note:** Empty propane tanks should be taken back to the vendor to be refilled or replaced. Check Brewers Hardware, Home Depot, or area gas stations. Also, for residential electric customers, Con Edison (800-430-9505 or www.conedhvacrebates.com) will remove unwanted refrigerators and freezers in working condition and will pay you \$50 for each.



How To Recycle In The Village of Mamaroneck



Place your recyclables in a recycling bin, a cardboard box, or an open garbage can (**never a plastic bag**) and put them at the curb Tuesday nights or by 5:30 a.m. on Wednesday mornings, **except on holidays**.

Bins may be purchased for \$5 each at the Village offices at the Regatta or at the DPW offices on Fayette Ave. They will be delivered to your home on your next garbage collection day.

You may also take recyclables to the Recycling Center on Fayette Ave., 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays, **except on holidays**.

COMMINGLED RECYCLABLES

PLASTICS, GLASS & METALS

Rinse clean and place together in a bin or other container, **never a plastic bag**. Labels need not be removed. Include all plastic and metal caps and lids.



WHAT TO RECYCLE:

PLASTIC—all plastics, any color, coded 1 through 7.

GLASS—bottles and jars, any color or size.

BEVERAGE CARTONS—see below.

METALS—food and beverage containers, empty aerosol cans, aluminum containers, foil and trays.

WHAT NOT TO RECYCLE—non-coded plastic, plastic bags, foam or vinyl, Styrofoam, metal utensils, hangers, windows, light bulbs, mirrors, scrap metal, wire, pipes, paint cans, auto parts, or containers that held hazardous materials such as motor oil, pesticides or solvents.

NEW! BEVERAGE CARTONS—Now recyclable: beverage cartons, including refrigerated “gable-top” cartons typically used for milk, cream and juice and non-refrigerated cartons containing non-dairy milk beverages, soup, broth, etc. Rinse and place them in your bin for commingled recyclables (plastics, glass and metals), **not** with paper and cardboard.

PAPER AND CARDBOARD

Place loose in a recycling bin, cardboard box, or brown paper bag, **never a plastic bag**. Remove plastic liners or packing materials and excessive adhesives.



WHAT TO RECYCLE:

PAPER—newspapers, glossy inserts, magazines, phone books, catalogs, junk mail, paper bags, office paper, tissue paper, and other paper goods.

CARDBOARD—corrugated and smooth/compressed cardboard, such as tissue, pizza, shoe, and cereal boxes.

WHAT NOT TO RECYCLE—plastic packing materials, books (softcover or hardcover).

TEXTILES RECYCLING

Tattered, worn, and stained textiles (bed linens, towels, clothes, drapes, shoes, handbags, soft toys, etc.), can be deposited in the Village’s textiles recycling bin in the parking lot of the Toy Box (300 W. Boston Post Road).

E-WASTE

Computers, monitors and TVs are collected curbside four times a year on the last Wednesdays in March, June, August, and November. You must call the Department of Public Works (914-777-7745) in advance to schedule a pickup.

Or take your E-waste (computers, monitors, TVs, **and anything else that plugs into the wall** such as lamps, radios, printers, keyboards, fax machines, small appliances, hair dryers, blenders, etc.) to the Village of Mamaroneck Recycling Center on Fayette Avenue. **Exceptions:** large appliances such as washers, freezers, stoves, air conditioners, refrigerators (see Bulk Metal & Appliances).

Or, if you prefer, you may take your E-waste to Westchester County’s Household Material Recovery Facility (H-MRF) in Valhalla (see Hazardous Waste).

ORGANIC YARD WASTE

Between April 1 and October 31, organic waste (leaves, clippings, brush, plants, branches, etc.) is picked up after garbage collection on your **second** garbage collection day. If your garbage is picked up on Monday and Thursday, organic waste will be collected after garbage pickup on Thursday. If your garbage is collected on Tuesday and Friday, organic waste will be collected after the garbage pickup on Friday.

It must be contained in biodegradable brown paper bags or open garbage cans (with drain holes at the bottom) and placed at the curb the night before or by 5:30 a.m. on the morning of the pickup.

WHAT TO RECYCLE—leaves, clippings, brush, plants, branches, etc. Brush and branches (no larger than 6 inches in diameter) should be bundled and tied (with a maximum length of 4 feet and a maximum weight of 75 pounds).

WHAT NOT TO RECYCLE—plastic bags, rocks, dirt, tree stumps, large logs or trash.

Gardeners may dump yard waste (bagged or loose) at the DPW transfer station on Fayette Avenue on Thursday and Friday afternoons between 12:30 and 2:30 p.m. Permits, available at the DPW offices on the second floor of 313 Fayette Avenue, are required. Vouchers for the permits may be purchased, for a fee of \$61 for up to every four (4) cubic yards of material, from the Clerk's Office, 123 Mamaroneck Avenue, between 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

FALL LEAVES

Curbside leaf pickup occurs during the months of November and December, when leaves must be raked loose to the curb, never more than 3 feet into the street. Leaves may also be placed at the curb in biodegradable brown paper bags.

During the entire year, residents and gardeners have three other options for the disposal of leaves:

LEAVE THEM—Shred leaves directly into your grass with a lawn mower (preferably a mulching lawn mower) where they will add nutrients, lighten the soil, and increase water retention. Or shred in your driveway and use as mulch. For more information, see www.LELENY.org.

COMPOST THEM—Add fallen leaves and other yard waste to a backyard compost pile. For information about composting, see <http://environment.westchestergov.com/>.

DUMP THEM—You may take leaves, bagged or loose, to the DPW transfer station on Fayette Avenue.

WHAT NOT TO FLUSH DOWN THE TOILET (OR DUMP IN A STORM DRAIN).

You can help prevent blocked sewer lines, clogged equipment in the sewage pump stations, and polluted water in Mamaroneck Harbor if you're careful about what you flush in the toilet, dump in the sink, pour down the storm drain or onto the ground.



Here, from the Village of Mamaroneck's Committee for the Environment, are the worst offenders:

Wipes, a major cause of sewer problems today. Made of cloth, they do not break down on their way through the pipes to the treatment plant. Wipes may be advertised as "flushable," but they cause major blockages and should be thrown in the garbage, **not** the toilet.

Other cloggers, such as paper towels, rags, diapers, tampons, bandages, band-aids, litter. Even tissues are best in the garbage because they don't break down as readily as toilet paper.

Grease, oils, and fats. They solidify and can block your own household pipes as well as the sewer lines. Collect them in an old jar with a screw top, store in the refrigerator until full, then put in the garbage.

Plastic, any variety, any size. It doesn't disintegrate.

Chemicals such as paint (including water-based), anti-freeze, solvents, pesticides, herbicides, kerosene. They are toxic and pollute the water in our streams, rivers, harbor, and Long Island Sound.

Prescription and over-the-counter drugs. These too end up in the water all around us where they are harmful to marine and human life.

HOW TO RECYCLE ALMOST ANYTHING in the Village of Mamaroneck

Should you toss it in the garbage, or can it be recycled? If so, how, where, when? Here is the scoop from the Village of Mamaroneck's Committee for the Environment (CFTE) about the environmentally correct disposal of some household items.

Books: Books, hardcover or paperback, are not recyclable. If they are in good condition, donate them to a library or thrift shop.

Drugs: Mix expired or unneeded prescription or over-the-counter drugs with garbage and throw away. **Or** take to the H-MRF in Valhalla. **Or** deposit them any time day or night in the special drop boxes located in the lobbies of the Mamaroneck Town Hall (740 Boston Post Rd.) or the Rye City Police Department (21 McCullough Pl.).

Aerosol cans: If they are *empty*, recycle them curbside. If not, they can go in the trash can.

Household batteries: Non-rechargeable and alkaline rechargeable batteries contain few toxic materials today and can be tossed in the trash. Drop off other rechargeables at a store that sells them **or** at the H-MRF.

Vehicle batteries: Take to retailers that sell them **or** to the H-MRF.

Used motor oil: Pour into a sturdy plastic container with a tight-fitting top and drop off at a service station **or** at the DPW on Fayette Ave. (between 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.).

Empty propane BBQ tanks: Take them back to the vendor to be refilled or replaced. **Or** deliver them with other hazardous materials to the H-MRF.

Styrofoam peanuts & bubble wrap: Take to ASAP or the UPS Store to be used again.

Plastic bags: Collect and deposit them at supermarkets and other large stores. Include bags from retailers, groceries, dry cleaners, newspapers. Also plastic packaging from paper products, bread, produce, cereal, etc., shrink wrap, freezer and storage bags. They must be *clean* and *dry* with strings and rigid handles removed. No bubble wrap.

Plastic containers for yogurt, cream cheese, cottage cheese, sour cream, margarine, etc., are now recyclable. Rinse them out and place them in the bin with your other plastics.

Plastic cups, glasses, utensils, dishes: Recycle only those coded 1 through 7. Toss the others in the trash.

Hard rigid plastic items such as toys, play equipment, baskets, furniture: Not recyclable. Intact, give away or donate. Broken, put out with the trash.

Paint: Harden unused paint by mixing with kitty litter or other absorbent pellet material. Place *empty or hardened* cans, lids off, in the garbage.

CFL bulbs and fluorescent tubes: *Intact* used bulbs and tubes can be taken to Home Depot or Lowe's for recycling. *Broken* bulbs or tubes should be carefully scooped up using disposable gloves and cardboard, sealed in two plastic bags, and placed in your *outside* garbage container. Include the gloves and the cardboard.

Incandescent light bulbs and LEDs: Throw them out with the trash.

Anything that plugs into the wall: Electrical and electronic devices and appliances such as broken lamps, toasters, hair dryers, printers, computers, TVs, microwaves, wired phones, hair dryers, monitors, etc. (except “white waste,” such as stoves and refrigerators). Tote all of it to the Village of Mamaroneck Recycling Center on Fayette Ave. **Or** take it to the H-MRF. **Or** schedule an appointment for curbside pickup of TVs, monitors, and computers on the last Wednesdays in March, June, August, and November. Call the DPW (777-7745) *in advance*.

Cardboard boxes are recyclable, no matter what color, size, kind, or purpose.

Tires: Retailers, including Mavis, accept them for free or for a nominal fee. **Or** take them to the H-MRF.

Building materials: Give a second life to construction materials (asphalt shingles, brick, drywall, cement blocks, lumber, paint, etc.) left over from home repairs or unwanted after demolition. Offer them to Westchester Habitat for Humanity (636-8335) in New Rochelle.

Eyeglasses: The Lions’ Club will donate them to people who need them, so drop them in the designated receptacles at Village Hall at the Regatta, Mamaroneck Public Library, as well as many local banks and eyeglass retailers.

Towels, blankets, small rugs: Animal shelters, such as the New Rochelle Humane Society (70 Portman Ave.), want them for bedding and comfort. Pet Rescue (7 Harrison Ave.) asks for towels only.

Tattered, worn, stained textiles: Bed linens, towels, clothes, drapes, shoes, handbags, soft toys, etc., that have no more life in them can now be deposited in the Village’s new textiles recycling bin located in the parking lot of the Toy Box (300 W. Boston Post Road).

Flower pots: Recycle plastic pots. Give away or toss pots made of ceramic or clay.

Hangers: Not recyclable. Offer metal hangers to your dry cleaner.

Dishes, ceramics, china, drinking glasses, mirrors, etc.: Broken, they go in the trash. Whole, they go to a thrift shop or a friend who can use them.
